Linlithgow Academy is a six-year comprehensive school offering over 1300 students in the Linlithgow, Winchburgh and Bridgend communities a progressive, relevant, challenging and enjoyable curriculum with opportunities for personalisation and choice.

Our vision statement "Together We Thrive" means we place an emphasis on collaboration and unity. It indicates we want our young people, our staff, and our parents/carers to work together as a community to create an environment where everyone can flourish academically, socially, and emotionally.

Inclusive approaches are now used more widely across the school to support pupil participation in learning, such as writable walls and write-on desks and scaffolding frameworks to facilitate self and peer assessment and promote reflection on learning. Introduced a new mobile phone in classroom policy to encourage stronger engagement as and dialogue amongst pupils and teachers. Our next steps will be: Investigate BGE curriculum models in other schools where a blocked model is used. Continue to challenge all pupils and, in particular, ensure that there is enough challenge within mixed ability groupings in the broad general education phase. To this end, continue to provote conter thinking in pupils and promote richer classroom dialogue. Continue to focus on the effective use of the school 'learner engagement framework' and associated tools for change to enhance the quality of pupils' learning experiences. Ensure these are embedded consistently across all classes.
